Notice is hereby given that the Hernando County Local Mitigation Strategy (LMS) Committee will hold its quarterly meeting on Wednesday, April 12, 2017 at 9 a.m. in the Emergency Operations Center, 18900 Cortez Boulevard, Brooksville, FL 34601.

The purpose of this meeting is to review, update and prioritize projects for the 2017 term. The general public is invited.

The LMS committee is coordinated by the Emergency Management staff and is comprised of representatives from government, business, industry, community associations and private citizens. The LMS committee is responsible for developing and maintaining the Local Mitigation Strategy Plan which promotes hazard mitigation and guides post-disaster recovery in Hernando County. Hazard Mitigation is any sustained action taken to reduce or eliminate the long-term risk to human life and property from hazards. Mitigation activities may be implemented prior to, during, or after an incident. Actions include planning to reduce or eliminate long-term risks to people, property, the environment, financial investments, other programs to reduce future losses, and to manage post-disaster recovery.

The Office of Sheriff:

The Office of the Sheriff is established by the Florida Constitution. As a constitutional officer, the Sheriff has the exclusive authority to administer his or her agency and is responsible for preserving the peace throughout the entire county, carrying out the laws of the state, the orders of Florida courts, and the ordinances of the Board of County Commissioners. The Sheriff is the chief law enforcement and correctional officer of the county.

Sheriff Al Nienhuis was initially appointed as the Sheriff of Hernando County by the Governor in January of 2011. He was then elected by the people of Hernando County in 2012, and remains accountable to them.
