Re: Missing Endangered Adult – Radames Torres-Garcia

Date: November 26, 2019

The Hernando County Sheriff's Office is requesting assistance from our media partners and the community in locating a **MISSING ENDANGERED ADULT**.

Radames Torres-Garcia was last seen on **11-25-19 at approximately 4:30 p.m.**, when he left his residence (area of Hollyhock Lane and Briarwood Lane in Spring Hill) on foot after a verbal dispute with family members.

Torres-Garcia is distraught over the recent discovery of information pertaining to his health. He made vague suicidal statements, took a kitchen knife and left on foot. No one has seen or heard from him since.

Radames Torres-Garcia's physical description is as follows:

White Male
Date of Birth – 08-11-1972
Height – 5'5"
Weight – 175 lbs.
Hair – Bald
Eyes – Brown
Shirt – Grey
Pants – Grey – Possibly sweat pants.

The Office of Sheriff:

The Office of the Sheriff is established by the Florida Constitution. As a constitutional officer, the Sheriff has the exclusive authority to administer his or her agency and is responsible for preserving the peace throughout the entire county, carrying out the laws of the state, the orders of Florida courts, and the ordinances of the Board of County Commissioners. The Sheriff is the chief law enforcement and correctional officer of the county.

Sheriff Al Nienhuis was initially appointed as the Sheriff of Hernando County by the Governor in January of 2011. He was then elected by the people of Hernando County in 2012, ran unopposed in 2016, and remains accountable to them.
