Mr. Farley has been located and returned to his residence.

A very alert citizen contacted the HCSO with information regarding his whereabouts after seeing the information on the agency's Facebook page.

Thank you, to the citizen who contacted us and to everyone who shared the information.

Original Information

The Hernando County Sheriff's Office is requesting assistance from our media partners and the community in locating a **MISSING ENDANGERED ADULT**.

Dravin David Farley was last seen on **03-26-20 at approximately 1 a.m.**, when he left his residence in the area of Talbot Circle (Spring Hill) on foot.

It is believed that Farley left the residence due to being upset over recent arguments with his father and step-mother and the recent loss of his biological mother.

Farley, who lives with his step-mother, suffers from several mental illnesses that require medication, which he does not have with him.

Dravin Farley functions with the mental capacity of an eight-year-old.

Dravin David Farley's physical description is as follows:

White Male

Date of Birth – 03-20-2002

Height – 5’8”
Weight – 135 lbs.
Hair – Black
Eyes – Brown
Clothing – Black Shorts, White Flip Flops, Unknown Shirt
Miscellaneous – Wears Glasses.

Farley has a bright orange backpack in his possession and is possibly in possession of a pocketknife.

Farley may be travelling on a bicycle, unknown description.

Farley is not known to be suicidal; however, it is abnormal for him to run away.

The Office of Sheriff:

The Office of the Sheriff is established by the Florida Constitution. As a constitutional officer, the Sheriff has the exclusive authority to administer his or her agency and is responsible for preserving the peace throughout the entire county, carrying out the laws of the state, the orders of Florida courts, and the ordinances of the Board of County Commissioners. The Sheriff is the chief law enforcement and correctional officer of the county.

Sheriff Al Nienhuis was initially appointed as the Sheriff of Hernando County by the Governor in January of 2011. He was then elected by the people of Hernando County in 2012, ran unopposed in 2016, and remains accountable to them.
